During his career, he served with the Waterloo Regional Police Service and was the liaison between the police and the Oktoberfest Thanksgiving Parade for many years before retiring. Unfortunately, Carl passed away in August of 2023 after a courageous battle with cancer. His wife June and daughter Vicki accepted the award in Carl's honour.
